## RESOLUTION NO. 23-\_\_\_\_

**WHEREAS** the City of Huntsville is in the process of building a new City Hall building; and

**WHEREAS** the City of Huntsville anticipates completion of construction on its new City Hall in mid-2024; and

**WHEREAS** one or more councilpersons have expressed interest in naming the new City Hall and/or other public buildings after individual(s) who have served the City or otherwise distinguished themselves; and

WHEREAS there has arisen some concern during the course of discussions on these issues as to whether there is any legal proscription against naming a public building after an individual and, if not, whether such action might implicate the provisions and/or restrictions of the Alabama Monument Preservation Act, which concerns should be resolved before taking further action as hereinabove discussed.

**THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED** that the City Attorney, Trey Riley, is hereby instructed to submit the following questions to the Office of the Attorney General and request his opinion relative thereto:

- 1. Is there any proscription in the law which would preclude naming a public building (e.g., City Hall) after a former mayor/legislator?
- 2. Would naming a public building after a former mayor/legislator implicate the provisions of the Alabama Monument Preservation Act of 2017?
- 3. Can the City Council name a public building after a former mayor/legislator, knowing that in the future the building would be modified, expanded or demolished?
- 4. Would the Alabama Monument Preservation Act classify a named building as a historic monument?
- 5. Would the Alabama Monument Preservation Act prohibit such modifying, expanding or demolishing the named building if it was classified as a historic monument?
