This agreement is between the United States Department of Transportation (the "USDOT") and the Alabama Department of Transportation (the "Recipient").

This agreement reflects the selection of the Recipient to receive a RAISE Grant for the Pedestrian Access and Redevelopment Corridor (PARC) project.

If schedule A to this agreement identifies a Designated Subrecipient, that Designated Subrecipient is also a party to this agreement, and the parties want the Designated Subrecipient to carry out the project with the Recipient's assistance and oversight.

The parties therefore agree to the following:

# ARTICLE 1 GENERAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS.

#### 1.1 General Terms and Conditions.

#### SCHEDULE B PROJECT ACTIVITIES

#### 1. General Project Description.

This project will design and construct multimodal improvements on approximately 1.2 miles of the Pedestrian Access and Redevelopment Corridor (PARC) linking downtown Huntsville to neighborhoods that are physically isolated by US 231/431, Governors Drive, and the Pinhook Creek. The scope consists of approximately 6,000 feet of multimodal improvements, a cable-suspended pedestrian bridge over US 431/US 231 and Governors Drive, three bowstring truss pedestrian bridges over Pinhook Creek and Huntsville Spring Branch, replacement of a railroad bridge, and flood mitigation measures.

## Component 1: Channel Improvements

- Widen approximately 3,200 linear feet of Pinhook Creek from Holmes Avenue to Memorial Parkway (US Hwy 231) to include excavation of the western channel bank for flood reduction and promote economic development within the downtown core.
- Benching above the high-water mark, with varying ranges between approximately 2.5- and 5-feet high with an average of 80-feet wide for additional flood control.
- Stream stabilization to include installation of a low flow channel to include harden edges and 8-foot-high retaining walls along the eastern channel bank.
- Dredging approximately 70,000 cubic yards of silt deposit from Pinhook Creek.
- Stream Restoration to include installation of spurs dikes and rock clusters to aid in sediment transport, bank protection and low-flow channel maintenance.

# Component 2: Cable Suspension Bridge

Construct a pedestrian bridge over US-431/US 231 (Memorial Parkway) and Governors Drive.

• Construct a cable suspended pedestrian bridge approximately 1,100 feet in length over two major US Highways (Memorial Parkway and Governors Drive) to improve safety, mobility and accessibility using alternate modes of transportation

- to connect under-served communities to employment centers, healthcare and public services.
- Bridge will be constructed utilizing three piers with a 12-foot-wide multiuse path to include 42-inch high railing and 8-feet high safety fencing and pedestrian lighting.

#### Component 3: Railroad Bridge

Remove and replace the existing Huntsville Madison County Railroad Bridge
with a new 440-foot long x 25-foot wide concrete deck bridge supported by 3-foot
diameter drilled shaft piers spaced approximately 34-feet apart to align parallel
with stream flow in Pinhook Creek to minimize flooding within the downtown
core.

Component 4: Bowstring Truss Pedestrian Bridges and Hardscape Construct pedestrian bridge over Pinhook Creek

- Construct approximately 6,000 linear feet of multimodal pedestrian and cyclist corridor within the bench area associated with the overflow of Pinhook Creek to promote connectivity and economic development within the downtown core.
- Construct three precast bowstring pedestrian bridges over Pinhook Creek to provide direct connectivity to job centers, public services and healthcare facilities

On May 10, 2024, the Alabama Department of Transportation (ALDOT) sent a written request to the FHWA Alabama Division for advance construction (23 U.S.C. 115) authorization to advance preliminary engineering activities. ALDOT requested advance construction for \$2,000,000 in RAISE Grant funds. The Division authorized advance construction on June 11, 2024.

Activities under that authorization are approved pre-award costs under 2 CFR 200.458.

### SCHEDULE E CHANGES FROM APPLICATION

**Scope**: As documented in the OST award letter, the proposed scope was adjusted to remove the building demolition and landscaping amenities.

**Schedule**: The overall completion date has moved out one year to December 31, 2028, due to the environmental process taking longer than originally anticipated.

**Budget**: The overall budget has increased significantly due to the level of inflation that has occurred since the estimate in the application was developed.

### 2. Supporting Narrative.

As the recipient of a HUD CNI grant, the City of Huntsville, in partnership with the Huntsville Housing Authority and the Mill Creek community, developed the Mill Creek Neighborhood Transformation Plan, which provides a framework focusing on three major community plans: Neighborhood, Housing, and People. The overarching goal for the People Plan is to create an environment and program of supportive services that help people in need achieve their life goals. This means creating high-quality and accessible education, employment, and healthcare programs for people at all stages of life, focusing on Education, Workforce Development, and Health. The Plan focuses on five main pillars: Education, Health, Economic Mobility, Housing Stability, and Resident Engagement. In partnership with Huntsville City Schools, Huntsville Hospital, Boys and Girls Club of America, and area employers, the Plan proposes new community resource centers that will provide services such as: early childhood education programs, employment access and placement programs, childcare services, a workforce development center, and health and mental health services. The Mill Creek Neighborhood will include workforce housing to support area employers. In addition, the City and the Huntsville Housing Authority (HHA) are currently restructuring public housing throughout the City to address aging properties and promote mixed-income developments to circumvent the effects of gentrification due to the City's unprecedented growth.

Furthermore, the City works with community-based organizations such as HATCH, a local workforce development program, that recruits nearby residents, provides access to skills training required for available jobs, and addresses any barriers hard-to-employ residents may encounter.

The City also provides opportunities for locally owned businesses and organizations for specific contracting services within the metropolitan area. Such opportunities could include construction, cleaning, and landscaping.
